Last Month's Speaker Max Rashbrook Reviewed by Malcom Law

Max Rashbrooke, of the Institute for Governance & Policy Studies, gave an informative talk where he evaluated the Labour Government's success at achieving economic equality in New Zealand.



He looked at incomes and how the bottom 50 percent of households compared to the top one per cent of households, then examined their net worth. As he has explained in a range of radio interviews and newspaper columns, there has been a widening disparity between the incomes of these two groups since the economic reforms of the 1980s (often called Rogernomics).

This gap is still increasing.

He also looked at how the Government has introduced policies to raise minimum wages and to reduce childhood poverty and examined what the result has been.

He pointed out that information from Treasury which shows us what is going on, is usually as much as a year out of date making such comparisons not as useful as we might hope.

He felt however, that the results of these policies have been mixed; there has been some improvement in the incomes of lower paid workers but this has not been even, or as radical as the Government may have wished.

Local History

Report from Brenda Baker

Local History group's final 2022 walk took us to Pukeahu National Memorial Park. We had visited the western side of the park earlier but this time we focused on the east.

We passed the Basin Reserve which was once a lagoon but became a swamp



when the earthquake of 1855 raised the land. But by 1866 it was Wellington's main cricket ground. We visited the memorial to victims of the Influenza Pandemic which started in 1918, then walked



through the Pacific Island section of the park to Mount Cook School which has a display of historic photos in its entrance.

Unfortunately, some problems with public transport meant that we reached the park much later than planned, so we had to hasten back to Courtenay Place to the Grand for lunch. The Grand is also a place of historic interest with many photos lining the walls.
