He says: There are those who would argue that these two activities are some of the pinnacles of human achievement.

I work in mathematics, specifically algorithmics and the theory of computation. I am a teacher and deviser of Scottish country dances.

I will try to explain how the cognitive processes in my kind of mathematics and dancing resemble one another. While doing so, I hope to give insight into a small part of modern mathematics which I know something about, and an interesting and fun dance form. I will illustrate with some videos and diagrams."
