Monday 8th July is our next meeting.

This brings us back to our usual meeting day – the 2^{nd} Monday of the month – after last month's meeting was a week later than usual. But it was well worth the wait to hear Jaenine Parkinson.

Last month's Speaker Jaenine Parkinson

Director of the New Zealand Portrait Gallery, Te Pūkenga Whakaata.



Jaenine gave us a whole new perspective on portraits. For example

Frances Hodgkins' *Still life: Self-portrait* painted c 1935 which does not show the artist herself, but features items that were important to her including a handbag, scarves and a hat. Te Papa Tongarewa purchased this painting in 1999 with NZ Lottery Grants Board funds.

Also explained was this photographic portrait of C. F. Goldie in his studio - attributed to Alfred Hill, ca. 1905-1910.



Goldie is working on a portrait of Patara Te Tuhi which can be seen on the easel on the right.

The New Zealand Portrait Gallery is in Shed 11, a heritage building on Wellington's waterfront. It is free and open daily including weekends from 10.30 - 4.30.

July Speaker Geoscientist Joshu Mountjoy

"Beyond New Zealand's coastline - Our Underwater Landscape."

NIWA's marine geoscientist studies seafloor processes including earthquakes, canyons, landslides, and the implications these have for society.

Thousand metre deep submarine canyons, subduction fault zones and mountain scale landslides work together to shape this hidden landscape.

NIWA's mapping efforts over the last 15 years have revealed much of this seafloor giving insight into the processes and time scales over which they occur.

Events like the 2016 Kaikoura Earthquake demonstrate just how dynamic our country is.



Joshu completed his PhD with the University of Canterbury and NIWA. He has a broad interest in seafloor geomorphology spanning submarine canyons, landslides, active tectonics, gas and gas hydrate systems and lakes.
