### **July Speaker**

Nicola Sladden - Banking Ombudsman

The Banking Ombudsman scheme helps prevent and resolve banking problems. An independent service, it offers advice to bank customers and to banks.

It helps to remedy things when they go wrong and deliver fair outcomes to both parties.

It received 4813 complaints in 2020-2021 year, 96% of which were resolved through their early resolution service.



Emeritus Scientist Hamish Campbell is an enthusiast for



the natural beauty of the Chatham Islands, which he showed in a wide-ranging talk about not just the geology, flora and fauna of the islands, but also their history from the arrival of the Moriori.

The Chathams are mostly flat, combining rocks formed

when they were part of the continents of Gonwanda and Zealandia with rocks formed later in a period of volcanic activity.



Isolated from the rest of New Zealand, the Chathams have unique species of animals and plants. He spoke about how the Chatham Islands Black Robin was brought back from the edge of extinction, but I think he forgot to mention

the Chatham Islands Forget Me Not!

Hamish offers 4-5 day trips to the Chathams at prices from \$4,600 per person. His programme includes four more trips this year and the first in 2023 is from Wed 24 to Mon 29 March.

### A word about calling 111

Call 111 if you or someone else is in danger. If it is not safe for you to speak when the operator answers, push 55 and you will be put through to police.

If you are calling from a mobile phone and don't speak a recorded message will ask you to press 55 if you need emergency help. This goes to police.

If you call 111 from a landline and don't speak, the operator will ask you to press any number on your phone if you require an emergency service. Do that and your call will go to the police.
