Last month's Speaker

Among the many social problems which the

Government is being called on to solve, is the issue of mental health and the shortage of psychologists. It was interesting therefore to hear Kate Dent Rennie, a psychotherapist talk about her work and the role of psychotherapists in mental health.



She began with a clip from the beginning of the film of The Lion the Witch and the Wardrobe, where the Pevensey children are being evacuated from London. Kate talked about the British Government policy to evacuate children from London during the Blitz. This was a well-intentioned policy but with major unforeseen consequences.

Kate's particular interest is in Attachment Theory and what happened to many of the children taken away from their parents. Many had life long consequences as a result of this experience. The main therapy used to assist them is psychotherapy.

Kate's approach to psychotherapy - bioenergetic analysis- recognises that there is no separation between the mind and body. When we experience emotional distress, this is felt in our bodies. Stress causes high blood pressure. When we feel fear, our pulses quicken.

Perhaps the most interesting aspect of her work was the revelation that Kate herself attends psychotherapy sessions to destress herself from the experience of working with people experiencing mental distress.

Although we do not have enough professionals to deal with the problems of mental illness, it was interesting to gain an insight into new methods of treating it and why treatment is so protracted.
