
May Speaker

Marilyn Garson grew up in Halifax, Canada, the youngest of four sisters. She studied political science and philosophy at the University of Toronto, and later added a Masters in International Development. A few weeks before she was due to enter law school, she discovered the backpack and absconded. She travelled for several years, and migrated to the Hokianga in the 10



migrated to the Hokianga in the 1980s.


In 1998, she began to create jobs in communities affected by war by launching locally owned social enterprises or working with small businesses. She has worked with former child combatants and Cambodians with disabilities (1998 – 2001), imported handmade goods as the founding director of Worldstock.com (2001 – 2003), worked with Afghan family businesses and led an enterprise that employed at women at home in Afghanistan and Pakistan (2005 – 2010).



In 2011, she received an unsolicited offer to work and live in the Gaza Strip. Gaza overturned much of what I thought I knew about conflict and aid, about Palestine and justice. As a Jew, Gaza made me dig deep into the content of my own beliefs. <u>Still Lives –</u> <u>a memoir of Gaza</u> tells the story of those four years, two wars, and one very unlikely social enterprise.

April Speaker

Conservationist James Lynch QSM gave an interesting talk where he explained how he and a group of dedicated conservationists promoted and put into action the proposal which became the Zealandia eco sanctuary.



He showed us that, as well as making a huge contribution to saving several native species from extinction, the work to establish Zealandia also resulted in many more New Zealanders committing to conserving our unique flora and fauna.

He also introduced us to the next project to establish another fenced eco sanctuary of 3350 hectares, in Wainuiomata using a preserved stand of Rata and Rimu trees. This would be 15 times the size of Zealandia. With a secure predator proof fence, the sanctuary would be a safe and suitable place to breed Kakapo, who need rimu berries in their diet to breed successfully. The proposed sanctuary could support 150 kakapo.



Needless to say it will be an expensive exercise and we have had enquiries from members who would like to donate to the new sanctuary. We will let you know when the project is approved and there is a fund we can donate to.

The group visited Pukeahu National War Memorial Park, built in 2015. Now beautifully established, it is on the site of a Te Atiawa pa. The artistry of the various memorials is very special.



The British memorial – oak and pohutukawa trees intertwine to form a beautiful leafy canopy - a Whakaruruhau shelter.

The Australian Memorial is inscribed on the black granite inset with the names of the theatres and operations in which Australians and New Zealanders served together. Other columns feature art works of the first people of both countries.



And next door is the distinctive Mt Cook prison built of bricks with the same arrow markings that were on the

uniforms of the prisoners who made them.
