## **November Speaker**



Gill Jolly, the Natural Hazards and Risk Theme Leader at GNS Science.

Gill is a volcanologist from the UK, who after researching magma physics for her PhD, started work at the British Geological Survey.

After exploring for gold and base metals in the

UK, Gill became involved in monitoring the eruption of Soufriere Hills Volcano, Montserrat from 1995 to 2005.

In 2006 she moved to GNS Science where she led the Volcanology team through New Zealand and South West Pacific eruptions, and subsequently led the Natural Hazards Division through the response to the 2016 M7.8 Kaikōura Earthquake.

Gill is also a member of the Prime Minister's Chief Science Advisor Forum and acts as a conduit between the natural hazards research community and senior decisionmakers.



#### October speaker

Cathrine Lloyd MA "The Language of Lace".

Cathrine spoke about the social history of French lace from the 17th century. She explained the intricacies of the work and how often it was specialised e.g. one woman worked all the buttonhole stitches while others added their specialised knots and stitches.






Because it was women's work lace-makers were unable to form a guild as craftsmen did to protect the interests of their craft and artisans. However, their labours resulted in very expensive lace worn by royalty and the upper classes.

Louis XIV wears

lace and other glorious finery to prove his status and wealth.

A bonus at the meeting was a demonstration by three lace makers of lacemaking and tatting techniques, giving us a chance to see how complicated and fine the work is to create such lovely pieces and patterns.
