Manager Botanic Gardens of Wellington

David delighted us with the early history of the



Wellington Botanic Gardens established in 1868.

The first manager, James Hector, of the New Zealand Institute, planted conifers as part of a programme to import plant species and assess their potential for economic benefit to New Zealand. The first Map of the Garden by John Buchanan published in 1875 included a list of all plants growing there, and a survey of native plants indigenous to the Reserve.

Some animals were kept at the Botanic Gardens before Wellington Zoo was founded in 1906. Wellington City Council took over the gardens in 1891.
